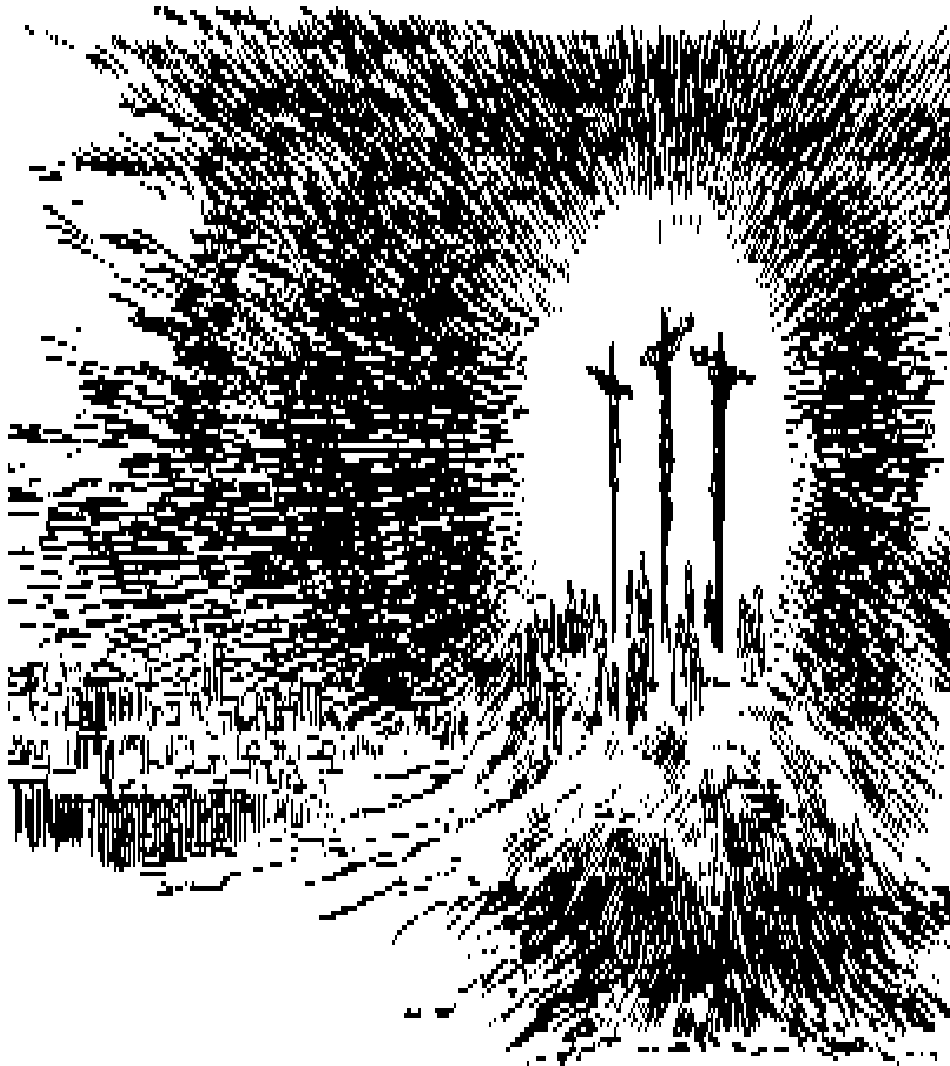

From the desk of the Pastor...

Greetings

I recently received a heart warming message from Northern Waters Presbytery announcing the Rev. Cliff Pendlebury Outreach Endowment Fund. As your Supply Minister it is with mixed blessings that I take up the office of pastor at St. Paul's. I am saddened that my presence here is because of Cliff's passing. He was a wonderful pastor and caregiver for many years to this congregation, and his ministry will be truly missed. At the same time I am delighted that you have extended an invitation to me to join the St. Paul's community to build on Cliff's legacy, and to offer my ministry in this time of transition as you, the congregation, work through your Joint Needs Assessment.

In every congregation there are times for reflection, and surely this is one of those times. As your Supply Minister I bring a

lifetime of dedication to the Church, along with skills in transitional ministry. It is my hope that my presence here will help provide this dedicated congregation the opportunity to seek out where God is calling you as a community. As you look around you are very aware that the role of any church community has changed significantly in the past forty years. The Church can no longer rely on everyone joining a congregation, let alone expect that everyone will attend a Sunday service. For the Church in the Twenty-first Century this is a period of exploration in which we are asked where God is calling us to be, and how best the Church should proclaim the ministry of Jesus.

I am your Supply Minister, and this may be a term that you are not all that familiar with. In the governance of the United Church of Canada a supply minister is anyone appointed to do the ministry of a pastor for a particular period of time. So in this appointment I am here for a fixed period of time, in this case until June 30, 2011. In my time here I will be doing all the various ministries that any pastor is required to do. While my term progresses the congregation's Joint Needs Assessment Committee will seek God's guidance in identifying the gifts, and the style of ministry St. Paul's will need to guide it into the near and distant future. As your Supply Minister I will not be part of this discussion. It is important that the congregation alone determines where God is calling you, and what type of pastor it needs.

I look forward to sharing this time of transition with you, and observing how God is calling all of us to follow this new path of faith on our life's journey.

Special events planned for 2010 include the Beef Dinner (September 29), a Car Rally (tentatively set for October 16) and the Christmas Dinner (December 7). Funds raised through the Beef Dinner and Car Rally will support special projects which will be determined later.

Other discussion items included developing guidelines for Convenors to use in showing appreciation to guest speakers; updating signing authority; reviewing membership club fees for future years; and developing written guidelines for use of the Sunshine Fund.

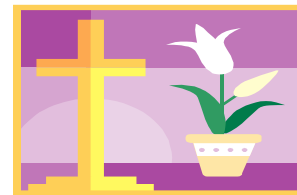
Convenors/workgroups have been identified to plan and deliver each month's programs. In February Bill Molesworth, Chief Librarian at the Midland Public Library, presented an overview of the developments in the new wing and the planned reorganization of the existing space. On March 2, Mary Ballantyne (Executive Director of Simcoe County Children's Aid Society), described her work and showed pictures of life in an orphanage and school in India (in a city whose population is bigger than the whole population of Canada), where she spent a three-month sabbatical last year. Mary identified many challenges in providing child welfare services in India and showed how similar social issues play out differently in India and Canada.

On April 6, at 7:30 PM in the Great Hall, the guest speaker will be Travis Cyr, who will speak about the services available through the

program **Retire at Home: Independence for Seniors, Peace of Mind for Families**. Anyone who is interested in learning about the range of services available for in-home support to seniors is cordially invited to attend along with regular club members. The evening will conclude with refreshments and further opportunities for fellowship and discussion of the topic.

Since our last service in the sanctuary, before renovations got under way, a major transformation has taken place at the front of

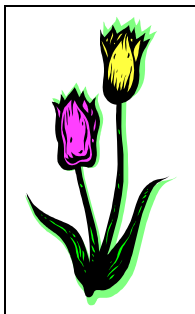
the church. When you read this, chances are that you will already have experienced a church service in the renovated facilities.

Report of the Joint Needs Assessment Committee (JNAC)...

Finding a New Minister: The search for a new minister cannot begin without some preliminary work to define our congregation and the kind of person we should seek. Regulations established by the United Church govern this process. The first step has the Official Board establish a Joint Needs Assessment Committee, (JNAC). Joint implies that the Presbytery is involved. Our Presbytery representatives are Rev. Keith Lockhart and lay representative Marion Locke. One of those two people must attend JNAC Meetings. There are 17 members drawn from the congregation who represent various interests and age in the congregation. Originally Jin Nicholson was designated chair but unfortunately he had to decline owing to health. He has however been an active participant.

The task of JNAC is to produce a report that upon completion has to be approved by the Official Board, then the Congregation and then by a senior committee of Presbytery. After that a Search Committee, using the JNAC report, will look for suitable candidates as Minister. The JNAC report will contain six

sections: Description of the community, Description of the congregation and its mission, Resources of the congregation, Recommended Position description, Skills required of incumbent, and finally Terms of employment. The JNAC met informally on the 14th December to meet one another and to distribute various documents. The first official meeting with a presbytery member present, namely, Rev Keith Lockhart occurred on Monday January 11th. Since then there have been meetings at two weekly intervals. The members of the committee are diligent and working well together to produce a report and recommendation. Rev. Keith Lockhart has attended all the meetings.

Good progress has been made. Five sections of the report have been drafted and await final review and consolidation. The remaining section is the most difficult to prepare as it involves establishing planning objectives to guide the talents and priorities envisaged for the future.

A questionnaire was distributed to the congregation at the Sunday service, February 7th, and elicited a very good return. Out of the 160 at church that day 134 questionnaires were filled out with a few others handed in later to the church office making a total of 140. That number represents about 20% of St. Paul's church family. It's probably not news but 87% of replies were done by people older than 55. Of all those responding 69% were women and 26% were men. 36% had attended at St. Paul's for more than 20 years. However 46% had been at St. Paul's for 9 years or less. The Committee believes that the survey response reliably represents the view of the congregation as a whole and has analysed the responses. Note well that all members and adherents of St. Paul's are welcome to bring their views and concerns to the attention of any member of the JNAC.

It was suggested that perhaps we should serve refreshments after each service while we are down-stairs, so we re-scheduled and it has proven to be very successful. Outreach Report...

This winter has been a busy one for the Outreach Committee.

First of all, the third and final wave of Lah Eh Shee's family arrived here in Canada on Thursday March 4th. This included Ner Ta Shee (Lah Eh Shee's brother), his wife Muset K'Trade and their baby daughter Ner K'Pru Shee. They are very excited and happy to be here in Canada and reunited with the rest of their family here in Midland.

They will be spend 4 days in Toronto in the second week of March for orientation to Canada and then will return to live here in Midland at 325 Manly St with Lah Eh Shee's family. Terry MacPherson and Susan McNeil of the Karen Sponsorship Committee will be their primary contact to support them, guide them and help them in anyway necessary. The Outreach Committee is very excited to finally have them here in Canada.

Secondly, there are a number of people with mental health issues or drug/alcohol addictions living in the Midland area, and some have created problems for police and downtown Midland merchants over the last few years. In 2007 the Town of Midland organized the Midland Street Outreach Program to assist

these people by counselling them and directing them to the appropriate support services. Currently the Midland Street Outreach Program is operating under temporary funding from the Town of Midland and from donations from other municipalities, churches and concerned people. Additional funding is required to maintain this program. During this season of Lent, we are requesting that all Lenten donations are directed to the Midland Street Outreach Program.

And finally, the Outreach Committee is very grateful for the ongoing support of the congregation for numerous outreach projects over the years. St. Paul's is blessed with a very generous and caring congregation. Thank you for caring. Greg Rothwell
