We went from planning one Christmas Eve service, to planning two separate worship services with lots of children and singers and candlelight. **Then everything changed!** Now we are back to an on-line service only with no in-person worship until further notice. It truly was a case of the heart saying one thing and the head



saying another, as the Transition Steering Team made their decision. But in the end, both our hearts and our minds were one. We care deeply about the well-being of our congregation. We know that Christ calls us to love one another and to look out for each other. This newest variant is so contagious that it spreads quickly and even masks cannot keep it at bay. **So, things did not go according to plan**. Now that reminds me of the Christmas story. A Message from the Transition Steering Team (TST)



The Transition Steering Team (TST) met on Friday December 17, 2021 to make decisions about in-person worship going forward, given the recent explosive increase in Covid-19 cases fuelled by the Omicron variant.

Our discussions very likely mirrored those that you have been having with your own family members about whether and how to celebrate Christmas this year with your family and friends. Many have already changed their plans to reduce travel and gathering sizes. These are agonizing discussions and decisions!

The TST has made the following decisions out of concern for the safety and continuing good health of all our congregants and staff:

1. The Christmas Eve service will be on-line only. Staff have made arrangements to video youth portions after church today (December 19) and so while there will be no inperson Christmas Eve Service this year, we know that you will enjoy the virtual service with the traditional participation of our children and our favourite animals on screen.

2. There will be no in-person church services from December 26, 2021 until further **notice.** We hope that you will continue to worship with us virtually, without worry about Omicron or winter weather. The Worship Team will prepare their usual excellent services for viewing on Sunday morning or whenever you choose to take a few quiet moments.

3. There are no meetings scheduled in the building until the second week of January. **The TST will meet during the first week of January to review the situation and make further decisions about small group meetings, based on further guidance from the Public Health Unit.**

As health officials have requested, St. Paul's staff will continue to work at home as much as possible and maintain strict safety measures when they do come into the building. Their health is a priority for us as well as the health of our congregants.
