An update from the Transition Steering Team (TST) January 5, 2022

The TST met by Zoom today and made the following decisions, given the magnitude of the OMICRON variant surge and in keeping with government requests to limit exposure in non-essential activities:

1. In-person church services will remain suspended indefinitely as per our December 17, 2021 decision. The Worship Team will continue to produce on-line services for at home viewing

- 2. Any funeral or wedding requests are to come to the TST for consideration against current public health information
- 3. Staff and volunteers are asked to suspend in-person visits on behalf of the church until further notice, except in palliative or emergency situations as determined by Karen
- 4. In-person meetings for our church groups are suspended until further direction from SMDHU and the TST
- 5. Use of our building is suspended for all user groups with the exception of Midland Small Set Nursery School until further notice

At this time, it is impossible to make any definite plans about when we will be able to resume in-person activities; however, the TST will be closely monitoring progress against this variant in Simcoe-Muskoka and will keep you informed of changes to the above decisions as the situation unfolds.

This Week's Minute for Mission:



David shares what your support means to him



Christmas is one of the loneliest times of year for David. In a series of tragic accidents, David lost his wife and children. And when it seemed things couldn't get any worse, life got even more painful.

"Ten years ago, my wife and I were living our dream, running a successful catering business in Vancouver. But that was before a drunk driver took my wife's life," says David. And that was just the beginning.

"The heartbreak was still fresh for me when, six weeks later, a work accident claimed the life of my 23-year-old son. In the blink of an eye, he was gone. A few months later, I got a call that my daughter's car had veered from the road. By the time she was found, she'd frozen to death." In five months, David's entire family was gone, and he turned to substances to numb the pain.

"My rock-bottom came when I was arrested for carrying drugs. In jail, I had a lot of time to think about the man I wanted to become. I knew I needed to make some huge changes if I wanted to be happy again and become the man my beloved wife and kids knew me to be."

The Bissell Centre—supported through your Mission & Service gifts—was the first place David went to when he was released.

"The staff greeted me with kindness. Instead of judging me, they welcomed me and handed me a warm plate of food. The staff told me about their mental health and housing support programs, and I was blown away. For the first time, I realized that I didn't have to rebuild my life alone," he says.
