## Information on St. Paul's Outreach Work 2023

Jesus said, "I was hungry and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me. I was naked and you clothed me. I was sick and you visited me. I was in prison and you came to see me. Whatsoever you do the least of these, you do unto me. Matthew 26:35-40

<u>Mission and Service Fund:</u> Every year, besides raising money for its own budget needs, St. Paul's raises between \$27,000 - \$28,000 for the United Church Mission and Service Fund, which assists in ministry both here in Canada and around the world. This fund for example enables Christian Island to have a United Church minister and helps pay for the costs of the United Church there. It helps with special projects that assist the most vulnerable people in society, both here and around the world. It also helps with special projects for congregations that enables them to carry out their ministry. The United Church Women (U.C.W.) give a substantial gift each year toward this fund. <u>Pastoral Care Volunteers</u>: St. Paul's has a team of committed volunteers who visit and/or call those who find it difficult to get out and feel isolated from their church and community.

<u>Supporting Families in Grief:</u> Karen works closely with grieving families and the U.C.W. offer support in providing funeral/memorial service luncheons when requested. Many different volunteers are part of this important work.

<u>Grief Groups</u>: St. Paul's has run both a Women's and a Men's Grief Group. Karen and co-leader John McCullough plan to start up a Men's Grief Group in September 2023. Karen is exploring the possibility of a Women's Grief Group if there is interest and leaders.

<u>Connections</u>: Pre-pandemic, St. Paul's hosted gatherings three afternoons a week from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. for people to pop by the church and have a coffee and a chat. They also assisted the office staff when anyone came in because they forgot the office was closed. Most importantly, this was a group where families could gather with a family member with dementia.

<u>The Benevolent Fund</u>: This fund helps those who are in need. We have helped people with food vouchers, food, assistance paying first and last month's rent so that they don't become homeless, help with the cost of electricity if people get behind in their bills, clothing, shelter, a child's program that assists with building self-esteem, counselling and transportation. Our Christmas Eve offering and some other donations help with this fund. The fund is confidential and our Minister is responsible for its administration.

<u>Newcomer/Refugees</u>: St. Paul's has a long history of working with refugees. This started years ago with the sponsoring of some Vietnam refugees. We then sponsored Karen refugees who fled what was at the time Burma. We sponsored a United Nations Urgent Action family from Africa,

assisted St. Mark's Anglican Lutheran Church with the sponsorship of a family of eight from Syria, sponsored another family of six from Afghanistan and are now working on assisting St. Mark's Anglican Lutheran Church with another refugee from Syria.

<u>Feeding the hungry - Monday Morning Drop-In:</u> For over 26 years and until the pandemic, St. Paul's was running this program. People who were hungry, homeless or just lonely were always welcome to join us for breakfast and some fellowship time every Monday morning. We served anywhere from 30-60 people. This is a program ended with the pandemic. The Guest House provides breakfast for its clients so there is no longer a need.

<u>Meals on Wheels</u>: The U.C.W. have been doing this every year since 1973 – a total of 50 years! They deliver meals every Tuesday.

<u>Gift of Grace Kitchen</u>: The U.C.W. provide the meals for them every Tuesday in August. They provide ten to twelve loaves of sandwiches each week for the month.

<u>Foodgrains Bank</u>: Every fall, St. Paul's has a special appeal for this Canadian charity, which provides food and agricultural support to nations around the world that struggle with feeding their own people.

<u>Guest House:</u> St. Paul's is an active ally of this shelter for the homeless. Pre-pandemic, there was a small team of St. Paul's volunteers who provided meals to them once a month. We are a sponsor of their fundraising campaign (Coldest Night of the Year) and provide volunteers who walk on our behalf, some assist with registrations while other assist with the meal that is provided for all involved in our Great Hall. St. Paul's also makes donations to the Guest House as part of our outreach.

<u>15 Local Community Groups</u>: These groups use our space here at the church. We believe that we are in partnership with our community. We have been the sponsor for the Scouts over 60 years now.

<u>Free hot chocolate at the Santa Claus Parade:</u> We do this to keep people warm. We also open our doors so that our washrooms are available to the public. It is also a place, especially for families with young children, to keep warm while they wait for the parade to begin.

## St. Paul's Choir



# This Week's Minute for Mission



"When children can't go to school, society suffers."



How do you make the world a better \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ place? You can start by taking kids to school.

Around the world, 57 million children are not able to attend school. As a result, they may never learn to read or write, to add or subtract, or many other skills that they need to succeed. Even more importantly, they never learn about their basic human rights.

It's a complicated problem, says Patti Talbot, the United

Church's Global Partnership Team Leader. "The work we do isn't going to lead to immediate societal change," she says, "but it will make a big difference down the road."

When children can't go to school, society suffers. And that is why Mission & Service is in partnership with 85 organizations that work to increase access to education across the globe.

Each partner has their own approach to education and skills training, each supported by your gifts to Mission & Service.

Colombia's Center for Communication uses arts and media to teach children about their rights. Women for Change in Zambia creates educational groups where participants share agricultural knowledge and awareness of their rights. At Japan's Asian Rural Institute, local leaders gather to learn sustainable agriculture techniques that they can take home and transform their communities.

"How can we make the world a better place?" asks Talbot before responding, "We can't do that by ourselves; our partners know best what the challenges are."

Talbot, a child of missionaries who was raised in Japan and Korea, knows that educational partnerships are critical. "In our partnerships, we learn from and teach each other," she says. "The United Church's focus is more than just sharing resources, but really sharing life together."

It's an approach that Talbot knows works, even if results take time. "Our partners are very grateful that the United Church of Canada has demonstrated over and over again that we are there for the long term," Talbot says.
