Acknowledgement of the Land and Commitment to Reconciliation:

Ahniin, This morning we acknowledge that we are gathered on land that is the traditional territory of Indigenous People. We gather in deep gratitude for their past, and ongoing, hospitality as we continue to live together on their land.

Today, our meeting place is still home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island, including Metis and our neighbours on Christian Island, Beausoleil First Nation. We are grateful to have the opportunity to worship and work on this land. We are all Treaty People.

On this Pride Sunday we honour those who identify as Two-Spirit. On Turtle Island, Two-Spirit people were often healers, visionaries, and leaders in their communities prior to colonization. Their ability to bring both masculine and feminine understanding was seen as a gift in their communities. The term Two-Spirit proposed by, Elder Myra Laramee, and was adopted in 1990 at the Third Annual Intertribal Native American, First Nations, Gay and Lesbian American Conference which was held in Winnipeg.

We commit ourselves to walking in a new way together: a path of healing and hope. Chi-Meegwetch²
